Learners in Larch have earned 'Chef of the week' for two individuals who managed so well in the kitchen, cooking recipes which really tested their ability and senses, well done! Oak class made some beautiful lemon polenta biscuits. Elm and Holly and post 16 learners made some stunning stuffed sweet peppers, using a wonderful mix of herbs, spice and sour lemon dressing. Hazel and Ash classes developed knife skills preparing vegetables for a saffrito which was used a base for a risotto bianco. Learners really enjoyed this creamy, starchy dish packed full of flavour.

Next week, Oak, Beech and Larch classes will be getting hands on with making some handmade pasta called Cortecce. Elm will have a go at making some Biscotti biscuits. Classes Holly & post 16 will continue practicing knife skills whilst making the risotto bianco. Finally Hazel and Ash will be making mountain lamb style kebabs.

Safeguarding

Safer Internet Day is taking place on the 7th February, and we will be discussing this with all learners in class next week. The theme this year is 'Want to talk about it? Making space for conversations about life online'. According to a recent study, most young people in the UK think their parents, carers, and teachers will 'misunderstand or overreact' to what they believe are "normal, unproblematic behaviour and experiences". It's therefore really important to try to have non-judgemental and calm discussions about internet use and social media with our learners, as this is the best way to learn about what they are experiencing and to help them become safer online.
